The Minnesota Association of Townships (MAT) is proud to announce its 2024 Scholarship Program, which awards up to five \$2,000 scholarships to high school juniors. All students currently enrolled in the 11th grade and attending a Minnesota public, private, or parochial high school, or a home-study program, are eligible for this program. Participants will submit a written essay on the topic of the role of townships in local government.

Applications for the scholarships must be submitted by June 1, 2024. Winners will be chosen and notified in **September** and invited to attend the Awards section of our Annual Conference in St. Cloud, Minnesota in early December 2024.

MAT is a nonprofit corporation representing Minnesota townships and its 9,000 plus officers. Townships embody the values of "grassroots government." MAT's specific purposes are educational and charitable: educating the public about the heritage and future of township government and its role in state government, and providing townships and their officers with a single, unified voice, as well as access to educational programs and research-based materials to help foster the delivery of efficient, effective, and economical township government.

And what policies should governments at all levels, (federal, state, and local) adopt to ensure that regardless of geographic location all Americans have equal access to broad band Internet?

Essays must be between 450 and 500 words, typed and double spaced.

- Applicants should not name themselves, their school, their town or city, or their local officials in or on the essay.
- Each essay will be judged by an independent panel based upon originality, knowledge of subject matter, and supporting statements, as well as correct spelling and punctuation.
- Applicants must be a high school junior to apply.

Along with the completed application and written essay, students must submit:

- A current high school transcript
- A letter of recommendation from a high school teacher or counselor
- All items must be submitted in one envelope postmarked by June 1, 2024, and mailed to:
